At the tactical in Kentucky last month, several Texas Rifles members were distressed to see repeated incidents of the use of modern forms of tobacco (i.e. cigarettes) in camp and on the march, as well as various persons drinking from Coke cans, and labelled modern canned goods visibly displayed in camp. Even though the public was not at the tactical, the authenticity guidelines should have been strictly adhered to - perhaps even more so than at a spectator event.

<u>Proposed Solution</u>: The company commander and/or the authenticity director should remind members <u>en masse</u> at each event of the authenticity guidelines. The guidelines should be enforced by NCOs and, primarily, through peer pressure by sponsors and other members.

SEMINAR FOR THE SIXTIES— (1860's, that is)

National experts on women's Civil War reenacting and participants from North and South gathered at Kentucky Dam Lodge March 15-17 for "Seminar for the Sixties—1860's, that is"). The Texas Rifles were represented by our own resident cooking expert Ana Draa and by Rhonda Hall and Vicki Betts who attended this most informative and well organized conference.

Juanita Leisch, author of <u>The Family Album: Ladies! Wear Daily</u>, kicked off the conference with "Fashion, Style, and Taste." She shared clothing information based on her extensive collection of cartes de visites and also brought original garments, pointing out key design and construction tips.

On Saturday participants chose from several workshops, including "A Bevy of Bonnets" with Beth Turza, "Hair, Beautiful Hair" with Ruth Ann Sherman, "Period Garment Construction" with Ruth Hendy, and "How to Run a Camp Kitchen for 50 People and Still Have Time to Visit Sutlers' Row" with Ana Draa. Interspersed were sessions on creating and building a first person impression, and Saturday night various scenarios were created by participants.

Sunday morning Sharon Moore and Luann Parrish demonstrated how to put up a wall tent in the rain (complete with rain!), how to insulate it and how to redirect water. Ruth Hendy, an Oklahoma health inspector, presented a very informative seminar on food safety in camp. Lana Weaver and Sharon Moore shared ideas on fund raising, both period and modern. Finally, Zebee Fortner, CPA, presented "Could I Claim This Hobby as a Dependent?"

Although all of the speakers were outstanding, an especially valuable addition to the seminar was the notebook of handouts, including sources of materials and bibliographies. Anyone desiring copies of any session's handouts should contact Vicki Betts, Ana Draa, or Rhonda Hall.





Pleasant Hill is located north of Many, Louisiana, and south of Mansfield, Louisiana, on HWY 175. This map shows the various routes to Pleasant Hill so you can select the route best for your. Please consult a Texas highway map for the roads into East Texas where this map begins.

If your route takes you north out of Many, the turnoff to Pleasant Hill is just a mile or so north of town. It is easy to miss, so be watchful.

The reenactment site and camps are located a few miles north of Pleasant Hill on HWY 175, and the camp is visible from the highway. You must register at the old farm house at the entrance to the property. We are registered as the Texas Rifles. Come Friday afternoon if possible.
